Introduction

Lantau Mountain Camp as Hong Kong's unique highland eco-cultural landscape

Perched between the saddle of Sunset Peak (869m, the third highest peak in Hong Kong) and Yi Tung Shan (749m, the ninth highest) on Lantau Island, Lantau Mountain Camp was established in 1925. It consists of a string of 19 rough-hewn single-story stone cabins and some amenity structures originally intended for multi-national, inter-denominational missionaries in South China and Hong Kong.

The origin of Lantau Mountain Camp can be traced back to some western Protestant missionaries and their families, who were engaged in evangelical and social development (such as establishing and operation schools and hospitals) endeavours around Guangdong in early twentieth century. They set up a summer camp on the mountain near Guangzhou as a spiritual and health retreat. By 1922, political unrest and deteriorating social order made it unsafe for the missionaries to spend their summer in the hills. They turned to the then British Hong Kong for help.¹ After several reconnaissances around Hong Kong's highland and negotiations with the government, they purchased twenty-odd land lots on the ridge between Sunset Peak and Yi Tung Shan at a government land auction in 1924, and built sturdy stone cabins here to form Lantau Mountain Camp to spend their summers here.

Over the century residents of Lantau Mountain Camp had diligently kept the camp and the cabins in decent condition. They also constructed and took care of the trails to the camp. The absence of electricity supply and municipal water and accessibility only on foot had kept life on the mountain reminiscent of a quaint village notwithstanding modernisation and changes of the society.

Lantau Mountain Camp and its environs feature pristine highland environment and unique cultural landscape. The surrounding natural environment where it situates is designated as country park area (bordering both Lantau South Country Park and Lantau North Country Park, as well as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) on the northwestern slope of Yi Tung Shan). The architectural compound is the highest in altitude of its kind in Hong Kong. The choice of location, characteristics and development of Lantau Mountain Camp are closely associated with the geographical attributes and surrounding environmental conditions. A conservation strategy plan for Lantau Mountain Camp is hence much needed.

1. Principles of Conservation for Lantau Mountain Camp of Yi Tung Shan

1.1 Connectivity with neighbouring areas of South Lantau and beyond

Accessibility and interaction of Lantau Mountain Camp with neighbouring areas of South Lantau are taken into consideration in formulating the strategy plan for its conservation. These include the physical hiking trails to Sunset Peak and Yi Tung Shan area (there is no vehicular road access; trailheads are at Nam Shan, Tung Chung and Pak Kung Au), involvement of local communities in the establishment and operation of Lantau Mountain Camp (mainly Tung Chung, Mui Wo and Pui O), as well as visitor experience (hikers territory-wide of Hong Kong) in the area.

1.2 Synergy between stakeholders

The conservation for Lantau Mountain Camp are pertinent to cabin owners/users (and their related organisations), hikers, villagers in the neighbouring areas and so on. The strategy plan addresses the concerns and needs of the stakeholders, creates synergy of different parties to leverage knowledge and resources for preservation and enhancement of the area, and strikes a balance between heritage conservation and respect for private property rights.

1.3 Awareness towards natural environment

Lantau Mountain Camp and its vicinity features highland environment, diverse natural habitat at different altitude ranges, as well as environments designated for nature conservation such as Country Park and Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). Historical use and human interaction of these natural landscapes and resources are looked into for conservation considerations.

1.4 Linkage of people, history and cultural heritage

The history and development of Lantau Mountain Camp is interwoven with Christian ministry by overseas missionaries in South China and Hong Kong. The study of its historical development and conservation of built heritage should reflect, apart from relationship with neighbouring communities, the religious activities in the area and related organisations beyond South Lantau.

<u>Methodology</u>

A. Desk-top research

Several government working papers provide the backbone of the content of this report. The above principles are formulated with reference to:

The first two working papers provide the background and direction for conservation of Lantau Mountain Camp, as well as Lantau and designated areas of Hong Kong as country parks and their vicinities on the whole. In drawing up the principles of conservation for Lantau Mountain Camp of Yi Tung Shan, considerations are given to the recommendations and initiatives stipulated in the papers, which include the assessment on the suitability of incorporating Yi Tung Shan enclave into Lantau South Country Park (LSCP) for its conservation value, landscape and aesthetic value, and education and engagement opportunities, improvements to visitor facilities on the hiking trails leading to Lantau Mountain Camp, preservation of the Lantau Mountain Camp with the owners of the stone chalets, and the possible designation of a camping site at a suitable location near Lantau Mountain Camp.

The third working paper outlines the values and guiding principles to be accentuated in the conservation for South Lantau. These involve understanding the uniqueness of South Lantau and the significance of its natural and cultural heritage, identifying and responding the needs and interests of both local communities and visitors, and sharing of these valuable stories territory-wide and beyond.

B. Archival study

Findings from archival study conducted during the investigation for *Cultural and Historical Studies of Lantau Mountain Camp in Yi Tung Shan* are made reference with in this strategy plan whenever appropriate.

C. Engagement with cabin owners, campers and stakeholders

Interviews and meetings were held with past and present cabin owners (both individual and society owners²) and campers, and stakeholders of Lantau Mountain Camp such as Lantau Mountain Camp Residents Association and volunteers. Throughout the project period, the research team had regularly kept them informed of the progress of the research, asked them for feedback on the findings of the study, and consulted them in formulating the conservation strategies for Lantau Mountain Camp and its vicinity.
